Transylvanian expat pianist & composer Lucian Ban and ELEVATION celebrate their 2nd album for Sunnyside records - *Songs from Afar*. Streams of influence from the past and cultural identities sometimes merge with one's quest for forms of expression. Songs From Afar represents two traditions, two musical worlds, and many musical elements coming together to fashion a unique identity that truly spans continents and styles.

"Songs from afar is very personal for me because the album is intimately tied to my Romanian cultural heritage and to the jazz influences that help me find out more about where I come from – and where I'm going. It's not only the ancient Transylvanian folk songs that we approach in this recording, it's also how the other pieces and improvisations reflect the constant search for musical meaning" notes Transylvanian expat pianist and composer Lucian Ban talking about his 2nd album with Elevation quartet in his 3rd appearance for Sunnyside.

Featuring the core band from the 2013 multiple BEST ALBUM OF THE YEAR "Mystery" (Sunnyside) with Abraham Burton saxophone, John Hebert bass and Eric McPherson drums, for Songs from Afar Lucian Ban has invited long time collaborator & master violist Mat Maneri to participate on several numbers along with Transylvanian singer Gavril Tarmure whose voice soars on the ancient Transylvanian folk songs.

ELEVATION was founded in New York in 2006 by pianist Lucian Ban and saxophonist Abraham Burton and has performed countless concerts and tours in the past decade "Like Wayne Shorter, McCoy Tyner and other vanguard bandleaders of that era, the Romanian born pianist-composer Lucian Ban alongside intense saxophonist Abraham Burton alongside bassist John Hebert and drummer Eric McPherson favor searching post bop that cranes toward the avant-garde without losing the buoyancy of swing" TIME OUT New York

The quartet's first album "Mystery" – an incendiary live set recorded in NYC - was released in 2013 by Sunnyside Records and won several BEST OF 2013 awards (Jeff Stockton @ NYC Jazz Record, Ken Micaleff @ Down Beat, Elzy Kolb @ Hot House) and spanned several tours.

ABRAHAM BURTON

New York saxophonist Abraham Burton's music has been called exquisite jazz. New York Times says about Burton "If the young saxophonist Abraham Burton was ever to be drawn in a cartoon, he'd have flames coming out of his saxophone. His solos are powerful and creative" He began developing his natural skills by attending Hartford's Hartt School of Music where he learned well from talented artists like Michael Carvin and Jackie McLean. Burton graduated from the school with a B.A. in music and a new love for the work of jazz greats such as Louis Armstrong and Lester



Young. In 1992, the young Burton became a member of the Wailers, a jazz band headed by longtime artist Arthur Taylor. The group released two albums together. They also did a number of tours through Europe.

He went on to form his own band in '94 entitled "The Abraham Burton Quartet" which recorded "Closest to the Sun", "The Magician" and "Cause and Effect" the latter being a collaboration with drummer extraordinaire Eric McPherson, on the Enja Records label. Abraham attributes much of his success from experiences acquired performing, touring and recording with masters and being affiliated with numerous and notable musicians such as Roy Haynes, Louis Hayes, Walter Bishop jr, Horace Tapscott, Kenny Barron, Jimmy Smith, John Hicks, Santi Debriano, Bill Saxton, Gary Bartz, Victor Lewis, Michael Carvin, Mulgrew Miller, Steve Nelson, Cindy Blackman, Ray Drummond, Terumasa Hino, Billy hart, Peter Washington, Conrad Herwig, Steve Davis, Grisella Oliphant, Rein De Graff, Nasheet waits, Eric McPherson, Eddie Henderson, David Murray, Antoine Rooney, James Carter, Yosuke Inoue, James Hurt, Marc Cary, Sam Newsome, Duane Eubanks, Winton Marcellus, Roy Hargrove, Wallace Rooney, Cyrus Chestnut, Christian McBride. LUCIAN BAN

Was raised in a small village in northwest Transylvania, in "the region where Bartók did his most extensive research and collecting of folk songs" and grew up listening to both traditional and classical music. He studied composition at the Bucharest Music Academy while simultaneously leading his own jazz groups, and notes that his approach to improvisation has been influenced by "the profound musical contributions of Romanian modern classical composers like Aurel Stroe, Anatol Vieru and of course Enesco." Desire to get closer to the source of jazz brought him to the US, and his ensembles have included many of New York's finest players. Twice nominated in 2005 & 2006 for prestigious Hans Koller "Best European Jazz

Musician Preis"Award, Ban currently lives in New York City where is part of the next generation of performers & composers at the forefront of contemporary modern jazz. He has released 11 albums as a leader for **Sunnyside Records**, **Jazzaway**, and **ECM Records**. ERIC McPHERSON

Considered One of the most important drummers of the new millennium Eric McPherson Born and raised in New York, Eric was immersed in music from birth on: Richard Davis, his godfather and an icon among jazz bassists, was present at his birth. It was Richard who suggested he be named after Eric Dolphy. By the time Eric was eight, he was teaching himself to play on a drum set borrowed from Charles Moffett. At twelve, he started seven years of formal drum studies under **Michael Carvin**, a master drummer and a brilliant teacher. Upon graduating, his mentor Michael Carvin recommended Eric to **Jackie McLean**. That led to a full scholarship for attending the Jackie McLean Institute at the Hartt



School of Music, University of Hartford. While still a student at Hartt, Jackie invited Eric to join the Jackie McLean Quintet along with Rene McLean, Alan Palmer and Nat Reeves. For the next 15 years, until Jackie's recent death, Eric was his drummer, following in the distinguished footsteps of drummers Michael Carvin, Billy Higgins, Jack DeJohnette and Tony Williams. Over those years, Eric recorded two CDs with Jackie and performed with him at major venues and festivals all over the Far East, Middle East, Latin America, Europe, the Caribbean, and the U.S. In addition to his touring and recording with Jackie McLean, Eric has also performed with a wide range of major jazz figures, including Pharaoh Sanders, Gary Bartz, Andrew Hill, Richard Davis, Claudia Acuna, Jason Moran, Greg Osby, Avishai Cohen and many others.
